US History 2 - Grade 10

Course Description

This course covers American History from the 1920's to the present. It is an academically rigorous course designed for students who have demonstrated consistently strong academic ability in writing and research as well as those students motivated towards independent learning. The pace of this course is rapid and will follow much of the AP curriculum. Students will be presented with an in-depth coverage of social, economic and political concepts. The role of the United States in global affairs will be a major aspect of this course. Primary source material is commonly used and students are expected to make extensive use of critical reading and writing skills.

Content Standards

In accordance with DESE standards, each term, Grade 10 students will:

- 1. Demonstrate civic knowledge, skills, and dispositions
- 2. Develop focused questions or problem statements and conduct inquiries
- 3. Organize information and data from multiple sources
- 4. Analyze the purpose and point of view of each source; distinguish opinion from fact
- 5. Evaluate the credibility, accuracy, and relevance of sources
- 6. Argue or explain conclusions, using valid reasoning and evidence
- 7. Determine next steps and take informed action, as appropriate

Leveling and Placement

When determining placement in *US History II Honors or Level 1* competency and ability in the following areas are considered:

- 1. Historical analysis skills for reading and writing
- 2. Test preparation skills
- 3. Independent study
- 4. Class pace
- 5. Teacher recommendation
- 6. Performance in Grade 8 Civics

Study skills and habits recommended:

- 1. Close reading of historical primary sources with a focus on the use of historical thinking skills
- 2. Annotate texts, primary and secondary sources for ease of analysis
- 3. Make quizlets or flashcards to prepare for exams
- 4. Self-advocacy in seeking extra help from the teacher during office hours or during class time if unsure of assignment standards

5. Use of Grammarly or proofreading on formal written submissions
