Global Studies - Honors - Grade 12

Course Description

This is a rigorous, college-level course in which students will examine the individual's role in the global society and the events that shape our changing world. Topics and themes include food and population, war, the spread of disease, human rights, sustainable development, empowerment of women, poverty, ecological degradation, and migration. Utilizing case studies, assigned nonfiction readings, and research, students will examine the root causes, effects, multiple perspectives as well as attempts to resolve international conflicts by developing critical reviews, comparative analysis, and argumentative essays and presentations.

Content Standards

In accordance with DESE standards, each term, Grade 12 Students will:

- 1. Demonstrate civic knowledge, skills, and dispositions
- 2. Develop focused questions or problem statements and conduct inquiries
- 3. Organize information and data from multiple sources
- 4. Analyze the purpose and point of view of each source; distinguish opinion from fact
- 5. Evaluate the credibility, accuracy, and relevance of sources
- 6. Argue or explain conclusions, using valid reasoning and evidence
- 7. Determine next steps and take informed action, as appropriate

Leveling and Placement

When determining placement in Global Studies competency and ability in the following areas are considered:

- 1. Historical analysis skills for reading and writing
- 2. Test preparation skills
- 3. Independent study
- 4. Class pace
- 5. Teacher recommendation
- 6. Performance in Grade 8 Civics

Study skills and habits recommended:

- 1. Close reading of historical primary sources with a focus on the use of historical thinking skills
- 2. Annotate texts, primary and secondary sources for ease of analysis
- 3. Make quizlets or flashcards to prepare for exams
- 4. Self-advocacy in seeking extra help from the teacher during office hours or during class time if unsure of assignment standards

5. Use of Grammarly or proofreading on formal written submissions

Energy	 How and why has global energy production, consumption, challenges, and solutions changed over time?
