

Social Studies Department Curriculum Guide 19th and 20th Century History Through Film Honors - Grade 12

Course Description

Using a thematic approach, this academic course will explore historical events and specific time periods as depicted through film as well as primary and secondary sources. Students will be required to make extensive use of their writing and communication skills. Films will be critiqued for historical accuracy and biases. This course will also focus on international topics that have had an impact on American culture, foreign policy and the role of the United States in world affairs. Books such as *The Grapes of Wrath, All Quiet on the Western Front,* or *The Right Stuff* will be assigned for summer reading and the test will be given in the fall.

Content Standards

In accordance with DESE standards, each term, Grade 12 students will:

- 1. Demonstrate civic knowledge, skills, and dispositions
- 2. Develop focused questions or problem statements and conduct inquiries
- 3. Organize information and data from multiple sources
- 4. Analyze the purpose and point of view of each source; distinguish opinion from fact
- 5. Evaluate the credibility, accuracy, and relevance of sources
- 6. Argue or explain conclusions, using valid reasoning and evidence
- 7. Determine next steps and take informed action, as appropriate

Leveling and Placement

When determining placement in *History Through Film* the following are considered:

- 1. Performance in Grade 11 World History, Grade 10 U.S. History II and Grade 9 U.S. History I
- 2. Successful completion of the three required History courses: US History I, US History II, and World History
- 3. Expectations for independent study
- 4. Complexity of assessments, readings, and writing assignments
- 5. Teacher recommendation

- Analysis of primary source documents, scholarly sources, and connections between history and current events.
- Develop active reading strategies such as annotating, sourcing, contextualizing, corroborating, and close reading.

- Test and quizzes
- Conduct short as well as more sustained research projects
- Engage with and create a variety of media such as political cartoons, photographs, documentary films
