

IMPACTS OF COVID-19 ON COLLEGE ADMISSIONS

- Admissions will understand if grades are incomplete or significantly different than previous years
- > Standardized tests may be less important than previous years
- > Essays may count more than ever before
- > Letters of recommendation may come from a teacher with whom students only know from hybrid or remote learning
- > The nations top schools saw a record number of early applications for fewer spots
- > The rest of the country's colleges are facing a decrease in enrollment

ADMISSIONS STANDARDS FOR THE MASSACHUSETTS STATE UNIVERSITIES AND UNIVERSITY OF MASSACHUSETTS



English	4 courses
Mathematics	4 courses (Algebra I and II and Geometry or Trigonometry or comparable math course work) including mathematics during the final year of high school
Science	3 courses (drawn from Natural Science and/or Physical Science and/or Technology/Engineering) including 3 courses with laboratory work.
Social Studies	2 courses (including 1 course in US History
Foreign Language	2 courses (in a single language)
Electives	2 courses (from the above subjects or from the Arts & Humanities or Computer Sciences
Required minimum weighted high school G.P.A	State University: 3.0 University of Massachusetts: 3.0



When does course selection begin? February-March 2022 for all grades

- Courses are recommended by current classroom teachers
- All course registrations are reviewed by the students guidance counselor

COURSE CURRICULUM PLANNING FOR HIGH SCHOOL

Students discuss course planning and selection each year with their guidance counselors so they are both challenged and successful.

Students are encouraged to enroll in courses that challenge them as well as pertain to their future goals, if possible.

If a student is thinking about attending college, they should consider the following **minimum** core course curriculum:

- 4 years of English
- 4 years of Math
- 3 years of Science
- 3 years of History
- 2 years of World Language



The College Process

- College Search and College Match
- Virtual College Tours, college profiles, scattergrams and admissions data
- Setting college preferences, creating resumes and creating an electronic portfolio
- View personal information including G.P.A, SAT/PSAT scores, etc.





THE PSAT/NMSQT

- All juniors were required to participate in the PSAT/NMSQT
- The test took place in October of 2021
- Scores are sent to students electronically from the College Board in early December (October exam)

How do I read PSAT Scores?


- The Benchmarks are the scores that represent college readiness.
- If a student scores at or above the benchmark, they are on track to be "ready" for college when they graduate high school

What is the average score?

 It is important to look at the benchmarks to determine the "average" score

Students with scores like yours increased their performance from the PSAT/NMSQT® to the SAT® by 130 points after 10 or more hours of personalized practice on Khan Academy®.

COLLEGE BOARD AND KHAN ACADEMY PARTNERSHIP

- 20 hours of practice on Khan Academy is associated with an average 115-point score increase
- In 2017, Khan Academy and the College Board, the maker of the SAT, analyzed gains between the PSAT/NMSQT and the SAT and found a positive relationship between use of Official SAT Practice and score improvements on the SAT.
- Students can link their PSAT scores to Khan Academy through their College Board account to receive personalized review based on their performance on the PSAT



STANDARDIZED TESTING: THE SAT

- Composed of three main sections- Math, Evidence-Based Reading, and Writing
- Scored out of 1600 points
- Students may register for the SAT at www.collegeboard.org

When should students take the SAT?

- Students are recommended to take the SAT in March, April or May of their junior year
- Tests are offered in March, May, June, August, October,
 November and December offsite
- Students can take the SAT at Hanover High School on Wednesday, April 13, 2022



THE PRE-ACT

The PreACT® offers 10th graders an early experience with ACT test items, provides a predicted ACT test score, and offers a wealth of information to help students get the start they need to be college ready.

Anchored on the ACT college and career readiness standards, PreACT assessments help educators, students, and parents, identify areas of academic strength and opportunity.

Students may opt to have their information shared with colleges and scholarship agencies when they take the PreACT, providing greater opportunities for recruitment and scholarship awards.



STANDARDIZED TESTING: THE ACT

- Contains multiple-choice tests in four areas: English, mathematics, reading and science
- Scored out of 36 points
- The writing test is optional and will not affect your composite score
- Takes 3 hours and 30 minutes to complete (including breaks)
- If you sign up for the optional essay, the test clocks just over 4 hours with breaks
- Students may register for the ACT at www.act.org

When should students take the ACT?


- It is recommended that students take the ACT at the end of their junior year
- Tests are offered in February, April, May, June, July, October and December.

SAT OR ACT?

Colleges accept both the SAT and the ACT as part of their admissions criteria.

Students can take both tests and send either their SAT or ACT score.

*College Board is no longer be offering SAT Subject tests or the SAT w/essay



TESTING OPTIONAL

Many colleges and universities have made standardized testing optional for students.

How do I know who is testing optional?

- Students can go directly to the college website to learn about admissions criteria
- Go to <u>www.fairtest.org</u> to view a list colleges with optional testing

Will I be at a disadvantage if I choose not to send my standardized testing scores?

• No. If a college is testing optional, they do not penalize students who do not send scores; nor do they provide an advantage to those who choose to have their test scores as part of their application.

Why are Colleges Becoming Test "Standardized tests only reveal Optional? verbal and mathematical aptitude within a very controlled "We often see no correlation between environment. . ." How do I know which type of admission plan is best for me if a college offers early action, restrictive early action or early decision?

Every students academic and personal profile is different. It is recommended that students and counselors discuss the type of admissions that best fits their profile.

The Common Application

- One application that can be used to apply to over 900 colleges
- Available on August 1st for the upcoming school year
- Go to www.commonapp.org to see which colleges accept the application

Coalition Application

- A diverse group of more than 150 distinguished colleges and universities
- Has a set of free online college planning tools that helps students learn about, prepare for, and apply to college

TEACHER RECOMMENDATIONS

 Ask two teachers, in person, for a letter of recommendation by the end of their junior year

 Teachers should be from two different subject areas or focus on the major the student wishes to pursue in college

 Provide them with a completed senior information sheet. This is provided to students during their junior workshop. It is also located on google classroom










THE COLLEGE ESSAY

What are the essay topics?

- Members of the common application allow students to choose from multiple essay prompts
- Colleges who do not use the common application may have essays specific to their school.

What are some tips for the college essay?

- Be creative and unique
- Get personal
- Ask teachers for assistance with writing style, grammar and content
- Ask guidance counselors for advice on topics and how to write a successful essay
