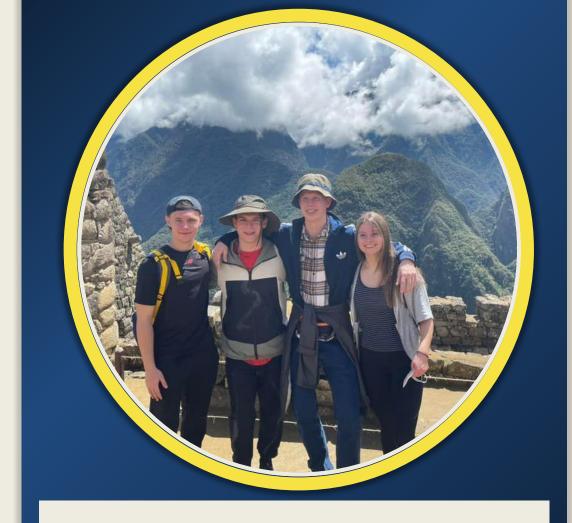

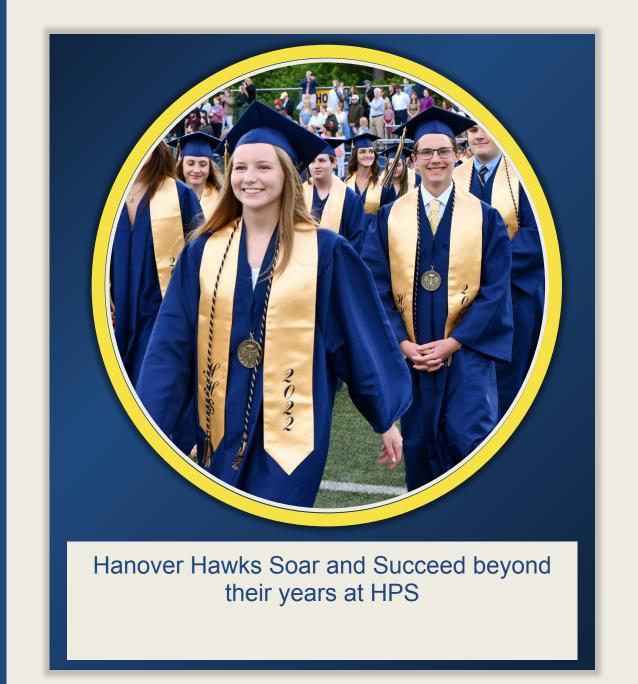

FY '24 Budget Priorities

Maintain a Level Services budget that includes:

- Funding to maintain our current staffing levels to support all students
- Funding to support the increasing needs for student services and rising special education costs
- Funding to maintain all academic and extracurricular programs
- Maintain support for our schools as a source of community pride, an economic driver, and a district that has the resources to support students of all abilities and interests

MAJOR BUDGET DRIVERS and ADVOCACY

Major Budget Drivers for FY '23 and FY '24:

- Unprecedented increase in student service costs
- Contractual salary increases for all union and non-union staff
- Unprecedented tuition increases planned for FY '24 (14% for private tuitions set by MA OSD)
- Unprecedented inflation

Advocacy for Legislative Support:

 MASS and MASC actively lobbying the MA Legislature to increase all funding for education but specifically increasing funding to offset the OSD tuition increase, fully fund and expand Circuit Breaker reimbursement, and increase reimbursement funding for out of district transportation.

FY '24 BUDGET PROJECTIONS: March 1

Since our initial projected budget analysis in early December, we have been monitoring trends and overruns in multiple cost centers - particularly in the area of student services. This is a very fluid situation and one that has exceeded our projections since the approval of the FY '23 budget last spring.
