# PART I: HANOVER SCHOOLS BUDGET PROCESS

## **School Budget Development Process**

**Fall:** map out our priorities for the upcoming fiscal year. This includes looking a known staffing needs, program development, curriculum needs and any building specific needs.

**November:** preliminary cost mapping predictions and planning. We also map state aid and other budget offsets.

**December:** School presents initial budget figures to the Town

**Ongoing:** The Town Manager works with all Town departments to coordinate and balance budget needs.

**January:** The Town Manager then creates a budget for the Town that is reviewed by the Selectboard and submitted to the Advisory Committee.

**February and March:** The Advisory Committee reviews the Town budget and meets with every department to examine budget priorities and expenditures.

**April:** The Advisory Committee makes recommendations for funding adjustments if necessary. The Advisory Committee also provides commentary on whether to support the multiple articles that are presented at the annual Town Meeting. Town Meeting then votes whether to accept (or in some cases modify) the overall operating budget for all departments along with all other warrant articles.

## **TOWN MEETING**

Town Meeting is the legislative body of Town government and is the opportunities for voters to directly set the funding for Town operations. Funding for items is contained within the Town Meeting warrant which is the book that contains all the warrant articles duly noticed, qualified and subject to decision. The Town Moderator presides over Town Meeting.

Warrant articles are submitted by Town departments or residents (called "petition" articles).

The Town Meeting warrant is set months ahead of Town Meeting which generally occurs on the first Monday in May. This year Town Meeting begins at 6:30 on May 1st.

Voters can vote to accept, reject (or in limited circumstances modify) the Town Meeting warrant articles and department budget lines.

Voters can speak on articles and ask questions prior to votes.

## FY '24 PART III: BUDGET OVERVIEW

## **FY '24 Budget Priorities**

Maintain a Level Services budget that includes:

- Funding to maintain our current staffing levels to support all students
- Funding to support the increasing needs for student services and rising special education costs
- Funding to maintain all academic and extracurricular programs
- Maintain support for our schools as a source of community pride, an economic driver, and a district that has the resources to support students of all abilities and interests

## FY '24 BUDGET PROJECTIONS: March 1

Since our initial projected budget analysis in early December, we have been monitoring trends and overruns in multiple cost centers - particularly in the area of student services. This is a very fluid situation and one that has exceeded our projections since the approval of the FY '23 budget last spring.
