College Readiness, 30% of the rating [All Students in the Class of 2018]

The proportion of 12th graders who took and passed at least one AP or IB exam. Passing is worth three times more than just taking.

Math and Reading Proficiency, 20% of the rating [All Students in the Class of 2020]

Aggregated scores on state assessments that students may be required to pass for graduation. In Massachusetts, the MCAS ELA and Math exams are used.

Math and Reading Performance, 20% of the rating [Underserved Students in the Class of 2020] How aggregated scores on state assessments compare to the U.S. News's expectations given the proportions of students who are black, Hispanic and from low-income households.

Underserved Student Performance, 10% of the rating [Underserved Students in the Class of 2020]
Scores on state assessments aggregated just among students who are black, Hispanic and from low-income households. These scores are compared to what is typical in the state for non-underserved students, with parity or higher being the goal. This is not a national rank; it is a relative state rank.

College Curriculum Breadth, 10% of the rating [AP Students in the Class of 2018]

The proportions of 12th graders who took and passed AP and IB exams in multiple areas. More exams are valued more than fewer exams up to a maximum of four. Passing an exam is worth three times more than taking.

**Graduation Rate,** 10% of the rating [All Students in the Class of 2018]

The proportion of entering 9th graders who graduated four academic years later.
